





Ages 2-5



Ages 3+








The Pocket Mommy




JoJo the Giant




Mustache Baby




The Tale of the Tooth Fairy






Is This Panama? A Migration Story




Magalie : Joyeuse Halloween (#8)




Les Dragouilles: Les Orangées De Dakar






Hey Canada!




Billy Stuart (Series)




Caribou Song




The Stamp Collector

Ages 10+





Parents appreciate that the story teaches readers about Canadian society from almost a century ago and that it provides opportunities to talk about sensitive subjects like teen pregnancy.
